Scope

This reference card provides technical information for the interface box that you purchased with your $Comtrol^{TM}$ controller.

The default setting for the interface box is RS-232 synchronous mode.

Prerequisites

This reference card assumes that you are somewhat familiar with installing equipment for your computer. It assumes that you have already configured and installed the controller.

Specifications

Table 1 lists specifications for the interface box.

Table 1. Interface Box Specifications

Refer to the documentation that came with the controller for specific information about the controller. See the *Programmer's Reference* for programming information.

Installing the Interface Box

Use the following procedure to install the interface box:

- Pull the interface box ribbon cable through the controller's expansion slot.
- Plug the interface box ribbon cable into the controller's ribbon cable connectors.
 To do this, snap J3 into connector P3 and snap J4 into connector P4.
- 3. Peel back the ribbon cable's copper shielding and position it against the inside of the mounting bracket.

- 4. Clamp the copper shielding against the mounting bracket by moving the adjustable portion of the mounting bracket into place.
 - This provides a ground for the ribbon cable.
- 5. Secure the mounting bracket by inserting the bottom screw.
- 6. Replace the system cover.

If you need pinout information for the ribbon cable connector that attaches to the controller, see the documentation that came with the controller.

Attaching the Peripherals

Use the following steps to attach your peripherals:

- 1. Connect your peripherals to the interface box. The ports on the interface box are numbered from 1 to 16
- 2. Use the following figure and Table 2 if you need information about DB25 connector pinouts.



Shielding Cables

The interface falls within the limits for a Class A computing device established by the FCC. To comply with these limits, the serial cables used to connect the controller to external devices should be shielded.

The shield should be connected to a metal or metallized connector shroud on each end of the cable. It is not necessary to connect the chassis ground pin of the DB25 connector.
